

In August, the county dedicated a statue to the hard-working canines of our department, especially for their heroic role in the rescue and recovery efforts in the aftermath of the terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center on September 11, 2001, at Eagle Rock Reservation.

We are extremely proud to note that our department was among the first to be contacted for

assistance by the New York and Port Authority police departments, and we provided and coordinated many vital support elements, such as blood deliveries, victim decontamination and the movement of heavy construction equipment.

Our K-9s were also deployed to Ground Zero. K-9 "Donzi", a cadaver dog, searched for human remains, while search-and-rescue dog "Bo" probed for the living. Bomb-detecting K-9s "Nikko" and Twilight" scoured lower Manhattan for possible secondary devices.

Our K-9s and their handlers worked long and grueling hours amid the rubble, the blazing fires, the remnants of
